Organics Recycling, Are You In Compliance?

The State's Mandatory Organic Waste Recycling law (AB 1826) requires all businesses generating more than two cubic yards of solid waste per week and multifamily residential properties with five dwelling units or more, to arrange for organics recycling services. Burrtec offers food waste and landscape waste service to assist in complying with the law.

You can comply by taking the following actions:

- Separate your organic waste from your trash and subscribe to food and/or landscape organics recycling service with Burrtec Waste Industries.
- Multifamily residential properties are required to establish recycling service for landscape organics only.
- Donate edible food to a food bank, or food rescue as appropriate. For food rescue information contact Community Action Partnership of San Bernardino County at (909) 723-1500 or Feeding America at (951) 359-4757.

You may be in compliance if:

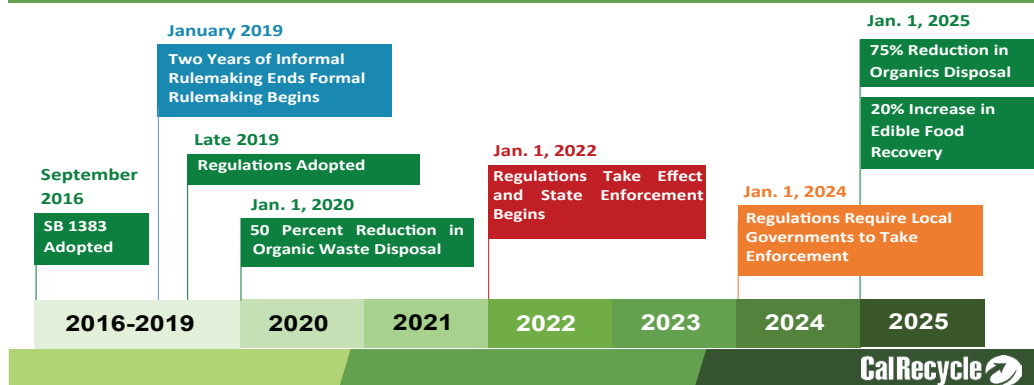
- Contract landscaper removes landscape organics as part of their service and takes it to a composting facility for recycling.
- Food waste organics are back-hauled to a distribution center for recycling.
- Food waste is donated to a non-profit for distribution to those in need.

New State Law in Senate Bill 1383

Senate Bill 1383 is an organic waste management requirement that will affect all businesses and multi-family complexes in California. The goal is to reduce emissions of short-lived climate pollutants in various sectors of the economy. Additionally, this bill will effect all food generating businesses such as grocery stores, wholesale food markets, food services distributors, and supermarkets. The goal is reduce food waste from ending up in the landfill. This can be done by arranging edible food to be sent to organizations or food recovery services that will collect edible food, or self-haul edible food to a recovery organization. Contamination of Recyclables Could Result in a Penalty Fee



Trash and other contaminants in the recycling or organics collection container(s) could result in a fee and non-collection due to contamination. If contamination is found, red-orange warning tape (as shown below) will be used to tape down the container lid. After the first warning, customers will be charged a \$46.84 contamination fee and the container will not be serviced as recyclable; it will be subsequently serviced as trash. Please note: the contamination fee will be automatically assessed if hazardous or biohazardous materials are placed in any collection container. Not sure about what goes in each container? California Assembly Bill 341 mandates businesses and public entities, generating 4-cubic yards of trash or more per week and multi-family residential dwellings with five or more units, to establish and maintain recycling service. Scavenging Hurts Businesses!

Whether it's called dumpster diving or scavenging, it is the unauthorized removal of recyclable materials placed in a designated container at a designated location for the purposes of collection and processing by an authorized agent. Removal of recyclable materials from a bin may increase the cost of collection services! Materials placed in a recycling bin have a value, and that value is used to offset collection and processing costs. When scavengers break the law by removing those materials, they are also removing items valuable to the recycling program, which ultimately affects rates. Do not approach or confront a scavenger! Get a description of the person and the vehicle with license plate number or take a picture. Then report the incident to the Rancho Cucamonga Police Department at 909-941-1488. Discourage scavenging - do not give permission to scavengers to take recyclables from your bins. Thank you for your continued support and cooperation!
